Gimson designed furniture ranging from simple rush-seated ladderback chairs to finely crafted cabinets, as well as metalwork, plasterwork, embroidery designs, and architectural interiors. Although he often designed rather than personally built every object, he worked closely with expert cabinetmakers and blacksmiths, emphasising honest materials, traditional techniques, and exceptional workmanship over industrial mass production.

Art historian **Nikolaus Pevsner** famously described Gimson as "the greatest of the English artist-craftsmen," reflecting his enduring reputation within the Arts and Crafts tradition. His drawings, furniture, and architectural plans are preserved in significant museum collections, particularly at The Wilson in Cheltenham, whose archive contains thousands of his designs and documents that illuminate both his creative process and his contribution to British design history.
